
Luke 7:18-35 ARE YOU THE ONE?





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BACKGROUND

Making Connections

After his two healings in Capernaum, word spreads about Jesus and his ministry. John, who was sent to prepare the way for the Messiah, sends two of his disciples to ask if Jesus is the one they have been awaiting. Because of Jesus' public ministry, Jesus continues to draw crowds like the one he speaks to in today's lesson.

Story Summary: Are You the One?

John had heard of the healings and ministry of Jesus, and sent two of his disciples to ask if Jesus was indeed the Messiah. The disciples' question provides an opening for Jesus to explain his purpose and ministry, and also the purpose of John's ministry. Jesus told the disciples to tell John all the things that they had seen.

Then, Jesus questions the crowd about what they expected to see when they went to see John the Baptist. He reminds them that John is a prophet, but a very special prophet, one who is to prepare the way for the Messiah. John had baptized many, but many others did not believe in John's teaching. Jesus contends that it seems the people ("this generation") are never happy. John did not eat or drink and people said he had a demon. Jesus eats and drinks and people say he is a glutton and drunkard. Jesus leaves them with a proverb about wisdom.

John was a messenger who pointed to the coming of the kingdom of God. We, too, can be messengers who continue to spread the message that Jesus, the Messiah, has come to bring healing and freedom, proclaiming God's new kingdom, just as John did.

The Point

Jesus is the Messiah, who proclaims God's kingdom as John did. God sent John to proclaim the kingdom of God with a baptism of repentance. Although John's role was important, his ministry was to point the way to the coming Messiah. Jesus comes with mighty miracles and teachings, all to proclaim the upside-down kingdom where the most honored are those most marginalized in human society.

Bible Nuts & Bolts: Understanding Miracle Stories



Spiritual Practice: Prayer





Living the Word: Teaching Kids God's Story

Narrative Lectionary, Year 3 (2024-2025)

LAST WEEK

A Roman commander comes to Jesus asking him to heal his servant by giving the command from far away, which Jesus does. Soon after, Jesus raises a dead man so he can take care of his mother (Luke 7:1-17).

THIS WEEK

John the Baptist hears about Jesus' ministry while he is in prison, so he sends two of his disciples to ask Jesus if he is the Messiah. Jesus points to his miracles to answer his question (Luke 7:18-35).

THEPOINT

Jesus is the Messiah, who proclaims God's kingdom as John did.

Family Devotions

As you hear and study these stories each week, consider what God has to say to you and your family. What is God's message to us? How should we respond?

Sunday-Read Luke 7:18-35

John is the messenger sent by God to prepare the way for healing through Jesus Christ. Make a plan to invite friends to church one day within the next month. Talk through ways to ask friends to come.

Monday-Read Proverbs 8:32-36

These wise words remind us that when we love God and others as the center of our lives, we find joy. Create a list of things that make you happy at home, at school, and at church. Draw a picture of your favorite happy memory.

Tuesday—Read Luke 8:4-10

This story reminds us to grow in God's Word. When those who are not growing in good soil try to grow, they will fail. Create flowers by drawing or using craft materials and hang them around your home as a reminder to grow in good soil.

Wednesday—Read Luke 8:11-15

Jesus explains the Parable of the Sower. Make a food creation together that reminds you of good soil. Some food creations might be dirt cake, cookies in flower shapes, etc.

Thursday—Read Luke 8:16-18

This story is a reminder that no one lights a candle and hides it. Our light that comes from following Jesus also should not be hidden but shown for all to see. Sing the song "This Little Light of Mine."

Friday-Read Luke 8:19-21

Jesus' mother and brothers were lost in the crowd. Jesus reminds us that anyone who hears his word and follows are his family, too. Take time and share fun stories about your family. Talk about grandparents, cousins, other caregivers, etc.

Saturday—Read Luke 8:22-25

Jesus was on a boat with the disciples and a storm came. Jesus calmed the storm with just his words. When have you experienced a bad storm? How did it make you feel? Give each other hugs or high fives as a reminder that Jesus calms our hearts during the storms in our lives.
